

Welcome all Entrants! Please see further regulations at the beginning of each section in each division.

- Participants are limited to 1 entry per category, maximum 15 entries per division.
- 2. Entry forms can be sent by email, submitted on line, or dropped off in the mail slot at the rear of the Hall (up the stairs on the north side). In-person entry forms will be collected on Saturday August 10, 10 am 3 pm and Monday August 12, 10 am 3 pm before the exhibition at the Hall. No entries will be accepted after 3 pm on **Monday August 12**.
- 3. Entry fees are by donation at time of dropping off exhibits.
- Submission of exhibits on Thursday August 15:
 Paintings, photography, and needle arts: 10 am 12 pm
 Children's exhibits: 10 am 12 pm.
 All other divisions: 4 pm 7 pm.

NO EXHIBITS WILL BE ACCEPTED AFTER THE INDICATED TIME.

- 5. The Fall Fair Committee will place the exhibits.
- 6. Fall Fair exhibits cannot be picked up until after the Fair closes. Pickup exhibits on Saturday August 17, 3 3:30 pm
- 7. The Agricultural Society will take all necessary precautions to protect exhibits but will not be liable for any loss, accident, damage or loss by any other cause.
- 8. Award ribbons will be given for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place in each category, providing that the exhibit merits the award (at the discretion of the judges). The decision of the judges is final in all cases, tinyurl.com/fall-fair-judging
- 9. Entries cannot be combined by two or more exhibitors.
- 10. Entries of a similar nature may not be entered in more than one division or sub-section of a division.
- 11. All vegetables, fruit or flowers must have been grown by the exhibitor on Mayne Island.
- 12. Entrance of exhibits for the exhibition in the Hall will be by donation.
- 13. The exhibition in the Hall will open at 12 pm 3:30 pm.
- 14. The Fall Fair organizers reserve the right to not to exhibit items deemed unsuitable for a family event.
- 15. Children (age 15 and under) **must** enter exhibits in Division VI.

FOOD SAFETY

Food Preparation Reminders to Prevent Food-borne Illnesses:

Keep Cooking Areas Clean

- Wash hands and surfaces often.
- Thoroughly wash hands, utensils, cutting boards and work surfaces.
- Thoroughly wash fruits and vegetables before using.
- When preserving and canning, sterilize jars before use.

Separate It

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- Don't cross-contaminate.
- Prevent cross-contamination by using separate cutting boards for meats, poultry, fruits, vegetables and breads.
- Clean cutting boards in the dishwasher or scrub with hot water and detergent after each use.

Cook It

- Cook products to recipe recommended times.
- When preserving, processing times are given for a specific jar size in each recipe.
- Follow the recipe to ensure full processing time for a safe product.

Bernardin publishes an excellent home canning and preserving book—"A Guide to Home Preserving", Bernardin of Canada Ltd., Etobicoke, Ontario, M8Z5V5.

After food is displayed at the fair it should be discarded. Exhibitors should not eat opened canned goods, jams, jellies or baked goods that have been on display.

CANNING AND PRESERVING

- Entries must have been canned since last year's fair.
- All canning entries should be:
- sealed in standard home canning jars. 1 pint (568.26 ml), 1 quart (1136.52 ml)
- jams and jellies (250 ml 375 ml or 8 12 oz)
- pickles and relishes (250 ml 500 ml or 8 16 oz, or 1 pint)
- Any standard canning jars (i.e. Mason, Kerr, Ball Bernardin, Gem, etc.) may be used as long as they are free of chips and cracks. Use new lids and rings with a metal snap lid. Leave metal ring on the jar to prevent spills after judging.
- The use of wax for seals of jams or jellies is not acceptable. Unsealed jars will be disqualified. (Exception: Freezer Jam, dried fruit, smoked or fermented products).
- Entries must be correctly labelled, including full date processed. Name to be on the bottom of jar.
- Jars previously used for brand name products (i.e. mayonnaise or cheese whiz) must not be exhibited.
- Do not top jar with cloth or other decorative covers. The class is not judged based on decoration.

HOME BAKING

- Entries to be brought in on paper, plastic or foil plates with clear wrapper (i.e. Saran Wrap).
- Baked items are limited to those that do not require refrigeration.

DIVISION III • Home Economics

- Exhibits are to be submitted Thursday, August 15, between 4 pm and 7 pm.
- Judging standards manual is available at the library as well as the Ag Hall on entry days.
- Participants are limited to one entry per category, maximum 15 entries per Division.

BAKING: Angela Pike

No commercial mixes or bread machines to be used in classes.

- 300. Bread, white, 454g (1 pound) pan
